BEAR LAKE AND GLOBAL WARMING

When I first joined LV Ranch as a member in 2004, driving through the front gate and catching my first view of Bear Lake was an awesome and beautifully majestic sight to behold. Then there was the Ranch House whose awesome deck looked out over Bear Lake. Those first impressions were big ones.

I recall many summer weekend camping trips (during my first few years) when the spring and summer rains had a big dampening effect on the fun of being outdoors (as well as on my evening campfires). I often pondered 'why it was' that it seemed to rain mostly on my free weekends? Many others would talk about how nice and warm it was on the very day before I arrived. Unloading (and reloading) camping gear 'in the rain' and staying 'under cover' for most of the daytime hours wasn't very much fun. It was still a welcome change from urban life, and I kept coming and hoping for mostly dryer weather during future camping trips.

Starting in about 2013, my wish came true, and LV Ranch entered a prolonged period of drought. Over the course of the following years, the average water level of Bear Lake seemed to slowly decrease, until it completely 'dried up' last summer. Another downside was the increasing frequency of 'fire bans.' I had never heard about a Stage III fire ban until last summer (where simply parking a vehicle in a grassy area was illegal).

According to LV Ranch records, the construction of Bear Lake was completed in May of 1966. My review of the Ranch Board Minutes revealed that the water level in Bear Lake ran very low during a couple of summers in the mid-1990s I didn't find any record indicating that Bear Lake had completely dried up like it did last summer.

Bear Lake is primarily supplied with water from two artesian springs. One is close to the lake (on the north side). The primary spring is a further distance away to the west, and it turns into a small trickling stream before its water reaches Bear Lake. Just like there was in the mid-1990s, there's been much talk about what 'could be done' in order to improve on Bear Lake's water level.

For sure, improving the connection between the two artesian springs seems to be a promising approach. Aspens and Willows have overgrown the trickling stream on the west side, and much thought is now being given to clearing away that foliage (from the stream).

It could also be that muskrats have burrowed a few holes through the lining of the lake, or that it needs a whole new lining (a layer of expansive dirt called bentonite). Or it could also be that we just need more wintertime snow and spring/summer rain? For the first time in many years, the front-range mountains have received an abundance of winter snow and spring rain. I'm once again wondering about whether my planned Memorial Day camping trip will be wet and cold. Maybe the end result of a returned weather pattern will be that the water level of Bear Lake returns without anybody having to do anything?

I recently listened to an amusing discussion about 'climate change' and its prior variation that was called 'global warming.' Its main theme was about man's seeming arrogance in believing that we now have control over 'creation' matters. Nevertheless, maybe if I stop driving to LV Ranch (and start walking there), stop eating beef and do a better job about recycling my glass and plastic waste items, I <u>can</u> make a difference in raising Bear Lake's water level?

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COLUMBARIUM

Great news! As the last newsletter was being printed, our second columbarium was being installed on a beautiful sunny day, with snow on the ground. A week later we had our first internment in the second columbarium. We also have a lovely bench for quiet reflection. We have gone ahead and ordered a third and final columbarium, to hopefully avoid any design and delivery issues.

The first columbarium has half a niche remaining. The second columbarium has eight niches available. The cost of a niche (which holds two sets of cremains) is \$1000. Half a niche (for one set of cremains) can be reserved for \$500. CAMPSITE CLEAN-UP MONTH

Along with Teller County's New Camping Laws comes the potential for an increase in visual campsite inspections made by code enforcement officials. To that end, the Ranch Board is dubbing August as a 'campsite cleanup month.'

In early August, a 30 yard roll-off dumpster is expected to arrive in the parking lot of the Ranch House parking lot. You are here encouraged to use that dumpster to dispose of non-perishable campsite debris, but please don't bring along any items from home to put in there. The disposal of televisions, monitors and computer equipment are also dumpster prohibited items. If the first dumpster gets filled up early in the month, it will be replaced by a second one.

The underlying idea is to help make LV Ranch more visually attractive for the benefit of all the members (as well as code enforcement officials).

ANNUAL ASSESSMENTS

TREASURER'S REPORT

A/R – Assessments is down because we had several people resign from Ranch. A/R Membership is up because we have several new members.

In order to continue current services available at the Ranch House we had to replace the refrigerator, coffee maker, toaster and smoke alarm. We also got new furnace filters, ice machine filters and defibrillator battery pack. Because of these items we had to purchase the Ranch House Expense is over budget. We will check the oxygen tank and make sure we have the necessary masks available. The first aid kit will be replenished.

The septic system backed up into the Fire Station restroom last fall. We had to clean out the pipes into the septic tank, call in a hazardous material cleanup company to clean up the mess and have the restroom walls repainted. Please limit the amount of toilet paper you put in the toilet. **Please** do not flush any paper towels, feminine products or Kleenex down the toilet. The problem was a wade of paper products that did not make it to the septic tank. The clean up was <u>expensive</u>. This also added into the Ranch House Expense being over budget.

Additionally, the grader needed some significant repairs to keep it operating.
