FISH, LAKES AND TREES

Bear Lake

Our beautiful Bear Lake needs more water. It's health relies on rainfall and snow pack. There is still enough depth to sustain fish into the winter but maybe not through the winter.

We normally have two trout deliveries a year, in late May and in late July to enhance good fishing for the Annual Fishing contest and the late summer and fall fishermen.

This year we did not have a second delivery to Bear Lake since it was already low.

Hopefully you have noticed and used the picnic areas on Bear Lake. Thanks to all who so cheerfully gave their time and energy to enhance the shore conditions for the Beautify LVR Day.

Be sure you know the contents of your rules sign which includes no wading or swimming.

Deer Lake is full thanks to the constant flow of water from the creek. The amount of weeds in the lake has increased each year and may have to be attended to next summer.

Trees

To create safer driving conditions we have taken out some of the young aspen to give drivers and hikers a better view of on coming traffic. Remember, no matter how clear the view is the speed limit is still 20.

Fish

I hope the fishing was good for you this season. Some of you may have enjoyed catching a Brown Trout which were reintroduced last year. Also introduced last year were the two to three pound Rainbows. I hope no one had their line snapped on those. For those fishermen who are fishing for fun and not for food, please do what you can to release the fish so that they will survive the ordeal.

Tips for Catch and Release

- 1. Use a single hook and use a pliers to squeeze down the barb.
- 2. Use a net to land the fish so they can remain in the water longer and don't flop around on the shore. If you do handle the fish be sure that your hand is wet.
- 3. If your fish is in shock and doesn't swim away, use your hand to move it back and forth until it can swim out of your hand.

RANCH TREES

The IREA electric company has been cutting live trees on the Ranch this past summer and fall, in an effort to keep the power lines clear of falling trees. They are also removing and chipping up the logs and branches. The Ranch Board is in support of these IREA efforts for reasons which are apparent.

Due to decreased roadway visibility caused by the new growth of Aspen trees, in relation to oncoming traffic (especially on roadway curves and at intersections), the Ranch Board has recently contracted with an individual to cut back the Aspen trees by approximately 10 feet on both sides of several of the Ranch's roadways. Those cut Aspen trees are to be hauled to a central location for intended wintertime burning (when the snow is on the ground). Given the underlying safety concerns, your cooperation with both of these efforts is here requested.

A question was recently posed to the Ranch Board as to 'who owns the trees situated on the Ranch's parcel?' The simple answer is that the Ranch, as an entity, owns all of the trees.

Instead of attempting to micro-manage 'tree-cutting' on the 664 acres, a good stewardship guideline for tree-cutting was adopted in Section 1.d. of the Ranch Rules and Regulations, which reads, as follows: d. Healthy, wildfire-defensive forestry is encouraged at LVR. Clear cutting is not permitted other than for building or camping or access thereto. Cutting of diseased trees, or thinning over-crowded trees, or transplanting small trees is permitted. For guidance please contact the Ranch Board.

Because Ranch Board places a high value on maintaining a healthy tree growth (especially in the aftermath of the Hayman fire), please exercise good judgment when it comes to cutting down healthy tree situated upon your membership lot. Use of the wood is also left to the good judgment of each member concerning those logs or branches. Please, however, don't remove any such timber from the lot of another member without first receiving permission to do so from that other member.

Uncle Dan's Nature Corner – Trees of The Forest

Likely the forest, the beautiful natural environment, was what first attracted you to LVR, and maybe originally to Colorado. So here's a quiz. Before you read further, close your eyes and name the types of trees in the LVR forest.

Hint, there are six of them to my knowledge. Four should be easy: Ponderosa pine, Douglas-fir, and Quaking aspen throughout the forest, Blue spruce along streams and wetter areas.

The fifth is 'cedar', AKA Rocky Mountain juniper, probably the same juniper more common in lower altitude piñon/juniper forests, but rare and shorter at 8600 feet. Until a couple of months ago that would have been my limit, and after 50+ years I thought I knew them all. But Debbie and I were hiking from the locked gate near Bear Lake up to Cedar Mountain Road and the quartz mine when I suddenly said: "What the heck is that tree?" (I'll insert a plug here for hiking as the best way to experience Nature - just as with my last Uncle Dan's on ticks, we likely wouldn't have noticed just driving by).

The tree was pine-like, but with shorter (about 2") needles and smaller (about 1") prickly cones. Two needles per bundle. A couple of pictures are included.

Once we got back to civilization, books and computers, we identified it as - ready? - Lodgepole pine! They start a couple of blocks beyond the locked LVR gate and get thicker as one approaches Cedar Mountain Road. They're all small, post-Hayman fire in that top-fire-devastated area, to around 10 feet tall. Along Cedar Mountain Road in that area are larger old-growth pre-Hayman lodgepoles, to around 80 feet. I'll include a couple of pictures of them. Don Dieter told me that he was aware decades ago of some in that area. They are not uncommon in Colorado.

So we did a survey of LVR for lodgepole. They all seem to be along the west edge. The best population was at the top of Eagle's Roost at the dead-end turnaround. Again most are small,

post-Hayman, but we saw some large ones also. We noticed occasional lodgepoles along both Deer Trail Drive and Columbine Loop.

It's an interesting tree, fast growing, tall and narrow, regular and straight. Evidently the 'lodgepole' name comes from use for Native American tipis. Lodgepole pine is especially a fire-propagated tree; the small cones are resinous and opened by fire. They evidently better colonize open ground, whereas our ponderosa, fir, and spruce often need cover for their seedlings and respond only after aspen or shrubs have grown up. Seedlings of lodgepole would be worth considering for planting in badly burned areas.

Please keep your eyes open for them.
