FROM THE ROADS GUY

I hope your summer and early fall have gone well and you had opportunities to come up here to the Ranch!

The roads here are in fair condition and could use some dressing up. Unfortunately between the weather and unforeseen problems with the tractor, not as much work on the roads was done as we all would like to see. In years past we have hired a professional grader operator. Our operator retired a couple years ago and replacements are hard to come by and quite expensive. Our plan this year was to have the Roads Guy run the tractor to keep the roads smooth this year. The tractor had a couple mechanical issues that kept it in the shop most all summer. It is back now, but we have had two good snows with heavy icing in spots on the roads so the roads are getting too frozen to do much more than grind down the blades on the equipment. If the weather and my schedule permit, I will try to hit the bad spots this fall. If there are places that are giving you problems, please let me know and I will try to get them addressed. One spot that was an issue was the "Y" at the south corner of Deer Trail and Ellison. That area was graded in August by a volunteer member and is in much better shape now.

Winter and snow are fast approaching. If you think you will need your driveway plowed, it would help me to take a look at the drive before it snows so I know about where I should plow. Snow stakes 3 or 4 feet beyond the edge of the drive would be great but are not necessary unless you have something you definitely don't want me to hit. I plow Deer Trail and Columbine Loop when the snow is about 3 or 4 inches deep. Other roads and drives are as requested. The folks at the Retreat plow Ellison, LVR Trail, and CR33 on Wildhorn out to the stone gate where the County takes over. For really deep snow we use the grader to keep the main roads open. If you come up in the winter, 4 wheel drive or chains are advised.

OUTDOOR LIGHTS – HELP KEEP OUR SKIES DARK!

At LV Ranch, we have an amazing opportunity to view the nighttime sky, stars and landscape in the absence of artificial lights. I'm here suggesting that we aim to preserve the pristine quality of our nighttime sky, for star and landscape viewing purposes.

A great many LV Ranch members (including me) live in urban areas and mostly come up to the Ranch during the fair weather months. As city dwellers, we have become accustomed to having porch lights, outside house lights, outdoor garage lights, yard lights, street lights. We are used to seeing traffic signal lights, lighted signs, and oh so many more lights regularly at night. I recently counted 15 street lights that are separately visible from my back porch after the tree leaves have fallen off. Admitted, the absence of artificial lights at the Ranch is often regarded as uncomfortable, ominous and even scary to some. I suppose that there's a human tendency to light up the dark places J.

This isn't about saying that we shouldn't have or use outside lights. Instead, it's about obtaining and using outdoor lights that have the bulbs recessed, shielded or hooded so that their light is emitted downward (toward the ground), instead of going out sideways. It's the glare from the filament or light bulb that is mostly visible to our neighbors. It's not about directing light to a specific outside area or space that is actually being lit up. The very same idea is used in construction of a common, coned desk lamp. The light only goes down toward the desk where it's needed, and not all around and into your eyes J.

Preserving the dark sky idea also includes having outdoor lights hooked up to a manual on/off switch, <u>and</u>: turning an outdoor light off when an outdoor area is not being used; turning an outdoor light off after a certain hour in the evening; and, for sure, turning an outdoor light off when you go back home for several days, weeks or months.

It's a little more expensive to purchase a hooded solar landscape light with a manual on/off switch. Then there's remembering to turn them to 'off' before you head back for home. Another good alternative would be just to collect up all of your inexpensive solar landscape lights and place them in your camper or shed before you leave for home. Then you can just stick them back in the ground again when you return and want to enjoy using them.

I advanced this thought in a previous Ramblings article. I'm doing it again since we have a lot of new members and homes under construction.

BUILDINGS AND SAFETY

Another great summer has come and gone at LVR. Our members continue to enjoy their lots in a variety of innovative ways! If you take a drive around the ranch, you'll see several of them, and I thought I'd take a second to review why folks might choose different options.

Tenting (\$100-\$200): This is the most accessible way of enjoying your lot. Leverage the ranch house for your showers, water, and amenities, and tenting at LVR can be a great time!



Shipping Container (\$5,000 to \$9,000 delivered): While most people don't stay in them, there is nothing stopping you. Shipping containers are an easy way to have an instant dry location for camping supplies and gear. If I had done a shipping container first, I would have saved scores of hours of packing and unpacking equipment. Do a google search to find them used online. Watch for "one trip" containers if you want a nicer one.



Pop Up Campers (<\$10,000, especially if used): Park your pop-up on lot and you'll have a pre-made camp whenever you come up. If your lot has electricity, all the better. Haul water from the ranch and bring some propane and you're good to go.



Camping Sheds (\$5,000 - \$20,000): Build one yourself or get Tough Shed to deliver. A permit is needed if bigger than 10'x12'. These have a "real structure" feel to them and can be insulated pretty easily. Heat them with a small wood stove or propane (safe for indoor use only) and you can extend your season. Many lots have several of these on them so multiple families or parents/kids can have privacy. If your handy, imagination is your only limit as to how "house-like" these can be.



BUILDINGS AND SAFETY (CONTINUED)

Campers and Camper Trailers (\$10,000-\$30,000): This is the most popular option at LVR due to portability and comfort. There is no problem with permits, except if you want to have an extended stay you'll need a camping letter from the ranch in case the county inquires. Obviously, you'll need a big truck to make this option work. Some folks haul their campers to the dump station and others have a way to empty without moving the trailer.



Tiny Houses (\$30,000 to \$100,000): These typically portable structures can be transported on roads, but are normally placed "for good" in one spot. They are built with standard home construction (2x4s) and most are plumbed to be usable full time. New (more supportive) laws for these were passed this year in Colorado, so look online for the latest.



The Cabin (\$100k+): This is the real deal. Join the growing neighborhood of seasonal and permanent LV Ranch residents and you'll enjoy all the best the ranch has to offer. You can pass down the property to your Lutheran children or sell to others if the need should arise.



Think about it this winter and get your upgrade requests in this spring!

As always... please be sure to go slowly (20mph) and close that gate when you come and go!

COLUMBARIUM

If you would like LVR to be your earthly resting place, there are several spaces available in the Ranch columbaria. The first columbarium has half a niche remaining. The second columbarium has three niches available. The third columbarium has 12 niches available. Niches are 11 1/4" (w) x 11 1/4" (h) x 10 1/2" (d). Standard size cremation containers are 6" (w) x 8" (h) x 4" (d). The cost of a niche (which holds two sets of cremains) is \$1000. Half a niche (for one set of cremains) can be reserved for \$500. If you are interested in reserving a niche, the application forms are available on the Ranch website or from Dee Paulson at dplakewood@comcast.net.
